Course Description:	A dynamic experiential education course providing the reflection framework and research support to maximize a student's learning from a work placement experience and connect it both to their course of study and their career aspirations, with an independent, semester-long research project as the primary assessment tool.

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	<p>Project Proposal (10%) As students begin to formulate their projects, they must propose a broad topic area, a research question and initial methodology. Students should also begin to research articles and references for their bibliography. The proposal will be reviewed by the academic supervisor, who will provide verbal and written feedback before allowing the student to continue their research proposal. (300 to 500 words)</p> <p>Digital Resume Portfolio (15%) Following the 'Workplace Preparation: Digital Resume and LinkedIn Profile' lecture, students are to construct a digital portfolio. This portfolio shall include an updated resume or CV and a comprehensive LinkedIn profile.</p> <p>Independent Research Project (40%) Drawing from the experience or specific observation in their work placement, students are to address a research question to be addressed in a 'term project'. Students will be required to demonstrate the ability to think critically about this issue and investigate the issue through an academic lens. The project will take the form of an extended paper with significant literary research to synthesize the arguments and ideas provided by the student. (4000 to 5000 words)</p> <p>Reflective Presentation (20%) Following the submission of their independent research paper, students are to prepare and provide a 10-12 minute presentation, reflecting on their internship experience. The presentation should explore the learning opportunities provided by the internship experience; an explanation of the tasks; roles and responsibilities of the placement and the subsequent challenges involved. Students should reflect on the skills they have acquired; the value of a placement with an Australian organization and how the placement has influenced their professional aspirations.</p> <p>Participation & Engagement (15%) Students are to complete the following components:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Attendance and active participation in ALL classes. • Either 2 x 500 word articles for the Arcadia Australia Blog relating to their internship experience OR 1 detailed 800-1000 word journal article providing details of their living and Internship experience. <p>Completion of the Internship self-evaluation survey form at the end of the Semester</p>
